### Native Canadian Centre Strikes Out!


It was Strikes, Spares and Laughter as The Second Annual Native Canadian Centre of Toronto's Bowl-A-Thon took place at Bowlerama Thorncliffe on Saturday, March 9th, 1996. A total of 42 teams took to the lanes in a successful effort raising in excess of \$13,000.00 ear-marked to go toward the continuation of projects and programs for the community that are conducted throughout the year at the Native Centre.

The response was terrific as more than 200 community members came together in a social event to support the *Centre*. A full afternoon of activities was scheduled by the committee and included bowling, food, lucky draws, trophy presentations and topped off with a raffle for a crisp new \$1,000 bill. It was particularly rewarding to watch as elders, youngsters and those inbetween took part in an inter-generational event geared to the enjoyment of all. The success of the *Bowl-A-Thon* was due mainly to the participation from local businesses and community members. Each participant was asked to collect personal sponsorship pledges for the event, turn money in at registration and then relax and be part of the festivities. Financial support came from all facets of the

community. It's through the support of community members that the *Native Centre* will continue to be a strong, thriving entity for grassroots involvement and participation. By the way, there are still some pledge forms out in the community and we are anxiously waiting for your money so we can do a final tally. Please help us finish this event. Turn in your pledge money as soon as possible.

The corporate trophy was presented to the Bank of Nova Scotia for its on-going support, while individual trophy winners were selected, by committee, for overall grace and dexterity on the lanes. Since most of the individual participants were new to the sport it was deemed unfair to base trophy awards on ability alone, so form and agility were the components used to determine the winners. Those receiving the coveted Five-pin Awards were Mary Fox for Style and Grace, Lori Waltenbury for Determination, and Brian Pingey for being Fleet of Foot. Tenpin Trophies went to Janette Bernard for Youthful Enthusiasm, George Lammers for his Ability to Entertain, and Sonya Mergler for her "Karen Kain" moves.



On March 1st-3rd, Native students held an extremely successful First Elders



The opening ceremonies took place on the Friday evening starting with the drummers and singers of the Council Fire youth. Lillian McGregor opened with a prayer to get the conference off to a good start. Some opening statements were made by Nadia Belokopitov and Drew Hill of the NSA of U. of T., Candy Isaac of the York NSA, and Darlene Samakese from Ryerson. Rodney Bobiwash, Director of First Nations House, also shared a few words. This was followed by a feast and social with about 250 people in attendance.

On the Saturday and Sunday, workshops included a discussion by Jacqui Lavalley on the Ojibway Midewiwin Society, and Diane Longboat on Traditions in Contemporary Education. Vera Martin conducted a workshop called Healing Ourselves, and Bartolo Alveres introduced us to some aspects of South American Cultures. Also, Curtis and Ronda Hopkins spoke on the Sweatlodge in Male and Female Perspectives, and Jimmy Groat talked about Keeping the Sacred Pipe (Jimmy, having just become a new papa to Tegan!, see Milestones). Lunches were provided by the Seniors of Wigwamen Terrace which also helped them to raise some funds. The food was excellent.

A draw was held with first prize, a Pendleton blanket won by young Danny George White of Toronto; young Danny bought over 26 tickets over the two days and he was a great help in selling the tickets too! Second prize, a custom jean jacket by Carolyn Cote, went to Martha Francis of Keswick, Ontario, and third prize, a dream-catcher, was won by Rose Logun. Congratulations to all the winners.

Special thank-yous go to Aboriginal Voices, the Native Women's Resource Centre, the Native Men's Residence, Council Fire, and to Gertie Mai Muise of Miziwe Biik Aboriginal Employment and Training, and M. 
